Pennsylvania Cyber Charter School FAST FACTS

The PA Cyber Charter funding formula is not in line with other states where funding comes from the state.

- Colorado funds full-time online schools at a state determined per pupil level
- Florida funds online schools only after successful student course completion
- Nevada funds online schools and traditional schools equally
- Michigan funds online schools and traditional schools equally
- Ohio funds online schools and traditional schools equally; online schools receive no local funding
- PDE presently does not investigate, and does not have the expertise or manpower to investigate tuition errors for residency, attendance, special education and eligibility. It is left up to the sending public school to "sue" for withheld subsidy to prove the error. Cyber charters ARE NOT accurate with attendance because they lose funds for lower attendance.
- There is no relationship between actual costs of cyber charter education and the money they receive from school districts. Cyber charter schools do not budget based on appropriate expenditures. They budget based on revenue. In other words, the revenue stream is guaranteed and can be spent whether needed or not. There is no accountability to a board that can levy taxes, is representative of the community needs, or can influence revenue.
- No cyber charter schools are making No Child Left Behind Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Why must school districts send money to failing schools when their own are making AYP?
- Most students who return to school districts from cyber charters arrive extremely far behind, often right before PSSA, and might have been given a special education label when they left without one. There is an over-identification of special education funding. Cyber charters have no limit to receive special ed funding as public schools do. All special education students receive nearly double regular education rate, regardless of disability.
- The profit margin for the "for profit" cyber management companies is taxpayer money. This is money not going to educate students, it is for shareholders. As an example, Agora Cyber receives six times the actual costs of providing <u>the same</u> service at a local public school. The profit goes to advertising and management. There is no limit to what can be paid to management companies.
- The Pennsylvania Department of Education's own data reports that charter schools spend more than twice that which district-run schools spend on administration.
- Cyber charter teachers ARE NOT subject to the same Act 82 Educator Effectiveness accountability regulations as school district teachers.
